



History favors equity investors after negative years

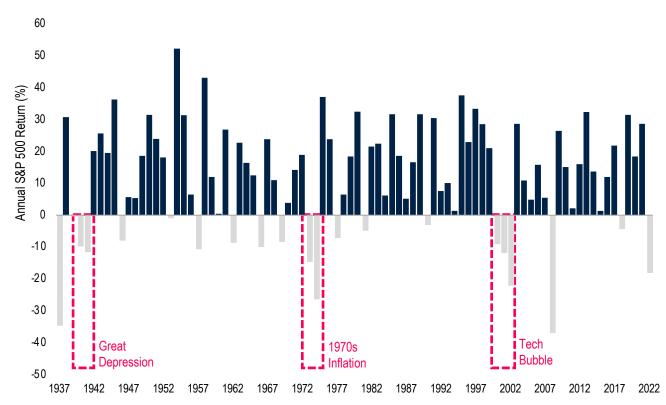
CHART HIGHLIGHTS

- While the S&P 500 fell 18% in 2022, back-to-back years declines are rare, occurring only three times in the past 86 years.
- The S&P 500 gained 15%, on average, in the year after its 21 negative calendar years since 1937.
